

## FROM OUR MINISTER – Rev. Patrick Evans



Dear Friends

The past two years has taught us is that life never returns to what it was, rather it moves forward into a new order shaped by our experience. We have heard the phrase the “new normal” as we learn to live in the present, shaped by the past.

For those who were closest to Jesus, the Easter Story has echoes of this

*Now Mary stood outside the tomb crying...Jesus said to her, “Mary.”She turned toward him and cried out in Aramaic, “Rabboni!” (Which means “Teacher”) Jesus said, “Do not hold on to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go instead to my brothers and tell them, ‘I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.’” Mary Magdalene went to the disciples with the news: “I have seen the Lord!” And she told them that he had said these things to her.*

*(John, Chapter 20, verses 11a, 16-18)*

Mary goes from a state of torrid grief, to one of confusion, thinking that the person she met outside the tomb was a gardener, to one of surprise at realizing it was in fact Jesus. He has risen! Her surprise must have taken days, weeks and longer to comprehend. For it

was not that the horrors of Good Friday had not happened, or that Jesus was fully human as he was before his murder, rather it was that he had been resurrected into a never before seen state. Mary had to get use to a new normal based on her experience of those days. She could not hold onto Jesus as she had previously done and as Jesus indicates she would want to do. Rather she had to come to terms that life was never going to revert back, for time had moved on. Nothing though could change what she witnessed that morning, resurrection had happened assuring us of life beyond death.

We worship a God of resurrection. In the midst of whatever we experience, may we too be witnesses to the power of resurrection.

## FUNERALS

It is with great sadness that we have to report, since the Christmas Link 2021, the following funerals have taken place.

Clarice Tinlin died on Wednesday, 15th December, 2021.

Clarice died as she had lived (30th August 1919 – 15th December 2021), loving her God, this church and her large blended family. We will remember her bright smile, her elegance and the joy she brought into any room she entered. Clarice knew that she was going to the arms of her beloved Jesus and so her funeral service was a true celebration of her life, with contributions from the five generations of her family all of whom miss her now and always. A Service of Celebration of Clarice's life took place on 30th December, 2022.

Grace Roberts died on Tuesday, 11th January, 2022. She was an enduring member of Liverpool Road Methodist Church and also involved for many years in the Young Wives and Women's Fellowship groups. Grace was a Canadian by birth but took out British Citizenship once settled in the U.K. She and her husband, Arthur, had two children, Marjorie and David, who were both active in our churches youth activities. From the family home in Farnborough Road they moved to Darwin Court, Cambridge Road where Arthur died. Grace's health deteriorated and eventually she was cared for at Sutton Grange Care Home. Grace's funeral took place at Southport Crematorium on Wednesday, 26th January 2022

Clive Pownceby

Clive's Funeral was held at Liverpool Road Methodist Church on Wednesday, 2nd February, 2022, because of expected large numbers attending. Clive was an active member of Waterloo Methodist Church and was well known throughout the North West and beyond for his interest in Folk Music. For many years he fronted the Bothy Folk Club at the Blundell Arms Hotel, The Shelbourne and, following their closures, Park Golf Club. For many years he was involved in the Annual Folk Festivals held at Whitby, North Yorkshire.

Paul Matthews died on Tuesday, 1st February, 2022.

Paul, as a youngster, was a former member of our Boys' Brigade Company at Liverpool Road, as were his three older brothers. He served with Merseyside Police rising to the rank of Chief Inspector upon retirement.

Paul was a church member, regularly greeting us in the vestibule on Sunday mornings. He would willingly take part in services, taking the offertory or reading lessons. Paul would often call upon people who were sick or in need, either in person or on the 'phone, offering help if required. A service to celebrate Paul's life, followed by Private Cremation took place on Friday, 18th March, 2022.

Derek Sale died on Thursday, 3rd March, 2022.

Derek, by profession was a draughtsman and worked for BAE at their Wharton plant for many years up to his retirement.

Derek, prior to his passing, had been ill for some 18 months or so and was cared for in a local Nursing Home. Previous to his illness Derek had been a most regular and active member of Liverpool Road for many years.

He, and his late wife Barbara, would produce *'The Link'* and also Derek, for a number of years, would take bookings for church meetings and the outside users of our premises. He was a longstanding member of the Wesley Guild and for a number of years the Guild's Treasurer.

His cremation took place on Monday, 21st March, 2022 with Derek's family and friends in attendance.

Tom Lloyd although not a member of Liverpool Road worshipped regularly St. John's, Birkdale. Some eight years ago Tom joined our Tuesday Facets Meeting. He was an enthusiastic member of the now ceased Calligraphy Group and of late the Arts Class. He attended Facets up to a short time ago and following illness passed away in his 91st year.

Tom Lloyd's funeral service took place at Liverpool Road Methodist Church on Monday, 21st March, 2022 followed by cremation at West Lancashire Crematoria.

Stanley Hagan died on Saturday, 19th March, 2022.

Stan had been unwell for the last couple of years and recently was cared for in a local Nursing Home. His main interest was gardening and he spent many hours tending his plants and lawn after work, and in his retirement. His other interest was drama and wherever his family lived he would be involved in the local drama groups. On his retirement from the Civil Service where he had served as Clerks to various Courts, up and down the country, he was awarded the Order of The British Empire. He was an active Church Member at Liverpool Road and often made his opinions known at Church Council, usually with a humorous turn of phrase.

A service of thanksgiving for Stan's life took place on Friday, 1st April, 2022, preceded by private cremation, which was attended by his family and many friends.

# FROM CHURCH COUNCIL

At our October 2021 meeting the main points to emerge were we discussed:

The shortfall in minister's pensions does need to be addressed but the proposed payment from our finance was £4000.00. That seemed too much to contribute at one time and John Attwater is looking at paying in annual instalments. The matter of same sex marriage would be discussed at a meeting in December (see later) We find it perverse that the circuit is stopping on-line services when the response is so good and there is a drive towards new forms of worship.

The December meeting to discuss same sex marriage ended in an indicative vote where many agreed with the concept although a significant minority were undecided / neutral. The Leadership Team were tasked with organising future meetings particularly as December was in the midst of winter and the Covid pandemic. That is not the best way to get an optimum attendance.

In January 2022 we discussed the way forward with our buildings. It emerged that a feasibility study can be financed outwith our church and we await this study with interest.

Our finances are still in a difficult place. Although we are likely to spend about £2000.00 less than budget, we are still using up our reserves because income is also falling and we will be at the minimum level in a few years. There is still time to do something and the action is with our leadership team.

Conversations with the local Church of England churches is complicated as they are searching for 2 ministers for the 3 churches. We are willing to talk with them but the initiative is with them.

In case you have missed it in the notices, Iona Worship is at 9.15 am most Thursday mornings in Church and Bible Study is at 7.00 pm in the New Room. All welcome

Our next Church Council is planned for 14th June in the Church. Anyone can attend but only council members may vote.

You will no doubt recall from the Autumn Link 2021, the 7<sup>th</sup> Southport Company of the Boys' Brigade connected with Liverpool Road Methodist Church, Birkdale for almost 77 years closed on Sunday, 10<sup>th</sup> October, 2021, just a month short of its actual enrolment anniversary on Armistice Day the 10<sup>th</sup> November 1944.



Oliver Hagan had been in our Company since he was five years old, joining the Anchor Boys, then at eight years the Junior Section, before moving into the Company Section as he went on to High (Secondary) School.

During the years in the Company, Oliver was an enthusiastic and loyal member gaining awards throughout his membership. On closure of the Company Oliver had gained The President's Badge and hoped to gain the Queen's Badge. He had learned new skills—chess; helped in the community—local Gymnastic Club as a young leader; was involved in Church activities— Messy Church, taking the offertory, escorting colours and reading lessons from time to time in services. 
