LEADERSHIP TEAM REPORT

As I set about writing a report on behalf of the Leadership Team, being the final one as Senior Steward, I have taken a look back at how we have developed as a church in recent years. Sometimes we fail to recognise answers to prayer as progress may not necessarily have taken place in the way we first anticipated. In 2020, all the churches in the circuit were challenged to consider their viability by preparing a Way Forward Review or, the alternative, an exit strategy. The four Stewards at that time set about positively to present Liverpool Road as a church that had a promising future, especially as a community hub alongside a worship centre. The format of the review was four parts: A survey completed by members and adherents to find out current perceptions of church; a historical perspective of Liverpool Road Methodist Church; An overview of how the church is functioning today; an investigation, through various meetings with relevant professionals, into the current needs of the community. This culminated in giving a presentation at a Circuit Meeting. A lot of research and data collection was involved in preparing this review. Our strengths and weaknesses, both in fulfilling our potential for mission and opportunities for worship and fellowship, were also an outcome. We continue to draw on the many gifts and skills of our members whilst recognising key challenges, such as the availability of leaders and volunteers, being relevant as a worshipping congregation to new people and having the funds to update our buildings and keep them in a good state of repair. This was the time that the country was emerging out of lockdown following the Covid-19 pandemic and there were lessons learned and experiments in communication trialled as a result of this. Circuit led initiatives in delivering services online were well received. Zoom meetings became the norm for a while. The benefit of bringing together musical talent from across the circuit to enhance worship was recognised and continues to be put to use during regular Circuit Services. The needs of people in the community also changed with a constant focus on how

the Covid experience had affected the mental health of children and adults alike. How have we emerged from this experience and reconnected both with each other as a worshipping community and the people in our neighbourhood? FACETS as a model of community engagement continues to offer people the opportunity for socialisation and learning.

FELLOWSHIP GROUPS – being able to meet again in person for fellowship after lock-down was most welcome. We are grateful for the commitment of the leaders of these groups to keep core opportunities for learning and caring going. YOUNG PEOPLE – this work carries on through the commitment of leaders of our Junior Church and Girls' Brigade Company, and we are grateful for that. In addition, we offer financial support to Southport & Area Schools Worker Trust that is able to reach young people in settings off church premises

SUPPORTING FAMILIES ON LOW INCOMES – The Food Pantry that has been set up in conjunction with Compassion Acts meets an important need in providing not only some basic food at a reduced cost to those in greatest need but also advice and counselling. Church volunteers who work on an allotment link into this providing fresh produce and the chance for people to work alongside them.

A PLACE TO BE – A space for quiet reflection came up in discussion as something that might be an important asset in the future. The opportunity to buy and use the piece of wasteland behind Brookfields property has gone but as a concept it might still be worth considering.

WARM SPACE/DROP-IN CENTRE - This was trialled in response to the sharp increase in the cost of heating homes. Although there was not the anticipated demand for this at our church, it is important to acknowledge the effort that went into setting it up.

UNDERSTANDING THE NEEDS OF THOSE IN THE NEIGHBOURHOOD - Time was spent arranging meetings, and forging links with, professionals who could direct people to church activities e.g. Social Prescriber for Birkdale, Community Connector, etc. A relationship was made with the people in post at the time.

TOOL SHED - The potential value in setting up this project was clear but the lack of volunteers to run it put the idea on hold. (A few years later this would resurface).

BEREAVEMENT JOURNEY – this course was launched and delivered at various sites across the town as demand determined. Whilst face to face delivery of this has recently encountered difficulties in the recruitment of volunteers, the course can be accessed online.

RAMBLING CLUB - A well-established programme of supervised walks in the summer, catering for different physical abilities, continued to provide an opportunity for socialising and exercise for people of all ages.

SEFTON COUNCIL for VOLUNTARY SERVICE – This has been a source of valuable information and support for faith groups as well as other charities. Networking to learn how other churches are responding to the needs of their neighbourhoods, help with sources of grant funding and a database of volunteers are examples of benefits.

ROOM RENTALS – Space to run group activities is a premium resource and there is currently no shortage of enquiries to rent our rooms. Our generous car parking space is an asset here. Through this, our links to Birkdale Community Library were forged, a relationship which continues to develop.

FEASIBILITY STUDY - Following on from The Way Forward Review, an exercise that was considered to have potential benefit to guide our discussions was an

official feasibility study. Grants were approved by the Circuit and District to fund this. The findings did demonstrate how our buildings could be modified or upgraded to be more flexible and up-to-date but securing sufficient funding to achieve any of the suggestions remained open-ended.

BIRKDALE COMMUNITY LIBRARY & HUB The challenge that we regularly face to meet our aspirations for outreach is the recruitment of enough volunteers to run an activity. This is where developing relationships with organisers of community groups can make a project become a reality. This has happened with the Tool Shed idea. In January 2021, an email was received on behalf of the Birkdale Community Hub and Library, sounding us out on the possibility of hiring space on our premises to open a branch of the library. In addition to offering a book lending facility, other activities they would be interested in running included a horticulture club, bicycle maintenance classes and Tool Shed. The integration and expansion of their activities into our weekly programme of room use has meant making some allowances on our part but through working together, shared objectives are slowly becoming a reality. The shower room has now become a useful drinks bay near the Primary Room; volunteers help to look after the gardens around the buildings and the growing need for storage space is being addressed by the possibility of hiring a large container. Funds for their activities are raised through book sales, and a portion of this money is used to buy both consumables for projects and equipment, both of which we benefit from. Offers of help from volunteers, from both the community and within the church family, who feel they have skills to offer for the Tool Shed are most welcome.

GRANT APPLICATIONS. We still have it in mind to submit another application for Heritage Lottery Funding to enable us to upgrade areas in the church. This would be needed for us to apply any of the suggestions of the Feasibility Study that was carried out on both our buildings. The recent problem with dry rot is

an illustration of the strain older buildings place on maintenance programmes and we must address such problems in the short term.

WHERE DO WE FIND OURSELVES TODAY? Underpinning all these developments have been regular opportunities to pray in groups as well as individually. We plan to hold an Away Day in the autumn at St Joseph's Prayer Centre in Formby, offering a time for reflection and further prayer about the future. A date will be arranged following this September Church Council Meeting during which outcomes of the Circuit Listening Events are anticipated. We welcome a new minister to the Circuit in the autumn, Revd Christopher Humble. He will take on the role of Superintendent and share in the responsibilities for the various churches. This will ease the filling of preaching appointments on the Circuit Plan for the next year. The need to fulfil the requirements for offering a safe spiritual and community base add a significant layer of administration to any new and existing activities. These can be time consuming, but we need to appreciate that safeguarding others and ourselves is very important, and we must respond with patience and understanding. For the Church Anniversary in

May, we celebrated spiritual growth and lives changed in the past. The response to the invitations to the service was very encouraging. Nostalgic reflections about years spent at Liverpool Road were shared by both Revd Tim Harrison, whose father was a minister in the circuit when Tim was a young boy, and the guests who joined us for the service and stayed to share in the Faith Lunch. Whilst we celebrate the influence of the past, we are also delighted that there are a few new regular faces in the congregation today, some of whom are also attending a Fellowship group. Today, our work and witness in the

neighbourhood continues through the strength of our commitment to love, care, befriend, share in fellowship and prayer, and provide welcoming spaces for worship and community groups. We are also grateful to those who have

been prepared to step forward to offer their skills and take on new responsibilities. This is something to celebrate. A new project offering support

to Carers in the community is in the early stages of discussion. Such a group is running successfully at another church in the circuit, so there is a model to learn from, but volunteer support has yet to be explored. Our links with other congregations are well established and this helps us experience different styles of worship in a variety of settings. There is also recognition that some activities or administrative tasks can be best fulfilled as a circuit. As the new Connexional year commences, the responsibilities of Senior Steward now fall on Dr Caroline Broadhurst who has life-long connections to Liverpool Road and has had past experience of this role. Since returning to Southport, Caroline has quickly settled into church life, helping out whenever called upon, and has followed through an idea to support families with young children in the neighbourhood in a practical way by setting up and resourcing monthly Pottery Painting Sessions for families with young children in the area. These sessions have been well supported and appreciated. The Stewards' Team will greatly benefit from her energy, commitment and overall leadership. In addition, I would like to express a sincere thank you to Pam Christopher for her contributions to the Stewards' team over a long period of time. Pam left the team at the beginning of June and is enjoying a new focus, a granddaughter. We welcome Marion Conroy and Katy Rushton as new Stewards and ask that they be remembered in prayers as they learn how to apply their individual talents to further the work and responsibilities of this role. Finally, I would like to thank everyone for their love and support as I have endeavoured to fulfil the role of Steward/Senior Steward to the best of my ability and assure you of my continued efforts and commitment to support the work and witness of Liverpool Road in future.

tracks. Andy has been making all the arrangements.

Some slates from the Hall Roof have been replaced and further work is required on the gable end of the large hall. The Girls' Brigade store room is presently in the process of being re-decorated, be it slow progress.

Two surveys have recently been undertaken:-

The oldest part of the cathedral, the Lady Chapel, was consecrated for worship in 1910. The cathedral is the largest one in Britain. If you haven't been it is well worth a visit and we would recommend a quided tour. There is no charge, but they suggest a donation of £5. We begin our autumn/winter programme on Tuesday, September 9th, with an evening meal at Dolce Vita Restaurant, in Ainsdale. This is followed every Tuesday evening, at 7.30 pm in the New Room, with a break over Christmas and the New Year. If you are at a loose end on a Tuesday evening, you are assured of a warm welcome. We end on a sad note, Brian Simmons, one of our long serving members, spent a few days in hospital, following a heart attack. When he was released he was advised to take things easy for a few days.
